Key features and landmarks	
Cliffs	East Cliff — 187 ft, made of shale, stone and clay. West Cliff — This side is much lower, with a deep capping of boulder clay over a sandstone base. This makes it less stable.
Fishing Ports	Both sides are rapidly eroding.  Whitby Harbour spreads over 80 acres. The commercial catch is cod and haddock.
Coastal areas	Whitby is a seaside town and port on the coast of Scarborough, facing the North Sea.
Dinosaur Coast	Around 35 miles long, stretching from Staithes to Flamborough.  Dinosaur footprints can be found on the beach in Whitsby.
Tourism	North York Moors National Park, Whitby Abbey, fishing.
Nearby rivers	River Esk runs through the town into the North Sea.
Swing Bridge	Crosses the River Esk and the harbour, sheltered by the Grade II listed East and West piers.
Moorland	Whitby is surrounded by moorland areas on its landward side.

Tourism	The commercial organisation and operation of holidays and visits to places of interest.	
Coastline	The area around a country where the land meets the sea	
Port	A town or city with a harbour or a place with access to navigable water where ships load or unload.	
Harbour	A place on the coast where ships moor.	
Moorland	An extensive area of moor.	
Town	A built up area, larger than a village, smaller than a city.	
Cliffs	A steep rock face, particularly at the edge of a sea.
